"Dose of Wisdom"

I would like to pick up where I left off last month talking about and teaching on FCPTC (first communion prior to confirmation). I would like to add the following paragraphs to discuss with you on the topic of FCPTC from Lutheran Catechesis written by Rev. Peter Bender from Peace Lutheran Church, Sussex, WI.

"Lutherans do not wish to make a law out of the gospel gift of the Sacrament of the Altar, but for the sake of faith in Christ and worthy reception of the Lord's Supper, the following is recommended before catechumens commune for the first time:

1. All catechumens learn by heart the Ten Commandments, the Creed, and the Lord's Prayer.

The primary text of the Ten Commandments, the Creed, and the Lord's Prayer are to be learned by heart before a catechumen begins to commune. It is also recommended that children learn the six chief parts of the catechism and their explanations by heart before communing for the first time. The reason for this is that the Small Catechism becomes a tutor for them in the faith as they continue to gain maturity. Adults, too, should continue to learn the catechism after they begin receiving the Sacrament, not only the primary texts of the catechism, but also their explanations. The point of such "learning by heart" is not that a certain body of knowledge is required for worthy reception of the Lord's Supper, but that such learning promotes repentance and faith in Christ. Luther said, "Those who refuse to learn are to be told that they are denying Christ and do not belong to Him. They are not to be admitted to the Sacrament, accepted as sponsors at Baptism, or allowed to exercise Christian liberty in any way" (Preface to the Small Catechism)

2. All catechumens are examined.

All catechumens are examined by the pastor according to the outline in the "Christian Questions with Their Answers." All questions in this section need not be asked, but they should include the following: "Do you believe that you are a sinner? How do you know this? Are you sorry for your sins? What have you deserved from God because of your sins? Do you hope to be saved? In whom then do you trust? Who is Christ? What has Christ done for you that you trust in Him? How do you know this? Do you believe... that the true body and blood of Christ are in the Sacrament?" The pastor exercises great pastoral care in admitting catechumens to the Lord's Table. The point is always, "Does this catechumen have faith in Christ that enables him to receive the Sacrament worthily?" If so, then the catechumens should be admitted to the Sacrament. Obviously, a developmentally disabled person may not have the same capacity as others to learn the catechism by heart. They should not, for that reason, be excluded from the Sacrament. It is rejection of Christ and a refusal to receive His Word that bars a person from receiving the Sacrament. It is recommended that there be no arbitrary age at which a person may begin communing for the first time. Any baptized Christian who confesses the faith as outlined here should be allowed to commune, regardless of age. The goal of catechesis and preaching is always worthy reception of the Sacrament.

3. All catechumens are absolved.

All catechumens are absolved by the pastor according to Christ's mandate to forgive the sins of penitent sinners. Holy Absolution should be given by the pastor to a catechumen in the context of his examination before he receives the Sacrament. The purpose of the examination is to hear the catechumen's confession of faith: "I am a sinner. I cannot save myself. Christ is my Savior. He died for me and shed His blood for me on the cross for the forgiveness of all my sins." Whoever confesses this

faith in the context of an examination by the pastor should receive Holy Absolution. "Son, be of good cheer. I forgive you all your sins in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit." The reception of Absolution in the context of a catechumen's examination strengthens his faith against a bad conscience, teaches him to rely upon the Word of God from outside himself, and gives him an even greater hunger for the Lord's body and blood. This recommendation squares well with the Lutheran Confessions: "The Sacrament is offered to those who wish for it after they have been examined and absolved (*Apology of the Augsburg Confession XXIV*, 249:1)." (Bender 13, 14)



The tabs are sold to a recycling center, and the RMHC chapter receives a check. Some of the local chapters receive upwards of \$30,000 from the sale of tabs each year.

It was held the week of June 2nd-6th. Students who are four years old (preschool) by the first day of VBS through the eighth grade were enrolled. A total of 145 youngsters were involved throughout the week. The Bible theme for the week was "

For by grace you have been saved through faith. And this is not your own doing; it is the gift of God. Ephesians 2:8

The sessions ran from 8:30 to 11:30 each day with opening and closing devotions in the church led by Pastor Ben Dose and music instruction by Tammy Brunner.

"Our offering collected this year went towards our mission project of "Gospel Nets" and our L.W.M.L organization. With our help The Lutheran Church Missouri Synod can help new churches around the world get the things they need to tell people about Jesus. All churches need to be able to wash people with Holy Baptism, teach the Word of God so people believe and feed them with the Lord's supper. Together through your support of Gospel Nets, we can join our brothers and sisters in Christ around the world and be fishers of men! \$5 can provide a Bible in another language; \$25 can provide Sunday School materials; \$100 can provide bicycles to help pastors travel between churches; \$500+can provide roofs for new church buildings.

Our local L.W.M.L group will use their portion of offerings to help purchase items still needed for School Kits and Health Kits and to also help with shipping the items. This amounted to \$860.95. Other health kit items, undergarments, school backpacks and shoes were collected.

Betty Nobiling & Denise Ragaller served as co-director and Deb Owen assisted with the secretarial needs. Newly confirmed teens, other church members and their friends assisted in all areas of need. Scott Linde and Allan Kock made the woodworking projects along with Al Schurke & Darin Schurke making the crosses,

Spencer Owen provided the craft project ideas. The 5th-8th graders also did an outstanding job of tying **35** quilts this year. Since 1993, VBS students have tied **640 quilts**. The ladies prepare all the materials for the quilts and the students tie them using the two frames that keep all the helpers hopping. There are **many**, **many** helpers who volunteer each day both with the crafts and the snacks.

It is truly appreciated how everyone comes forth each year for the week of Vacation Bible School. Thanks again to Lila Thiedeman for the fresh bread on Monday L & E construction for the rolls on Tuesday and to Darleen Linde for all the juice drink. Parents assisted with other food snacks throughout the week...including Rice Krispie Bars and cookies. The ice cream sandwiches provided by the Ehlers' family are a real treat on Friday. It is a fun week and hopefully, memories are created that will last a lifetime.







Me? A Missionary?

In the past 13 years of leading IOWAY mission trips I have had the honor and privilege of working with truly amazing youth and adults. One of these amazing people is Spencer Owen. Spencer, a member of Zion-Arcadia and a student at Concordia Nebraska, has been on several IOWAY mission trips through the past several years. I asked him to share some of the highlights from his mission trips along with how missions have influenced his life.




Spencer shares, "Missionary – a word that we often don't associate with ourselves. When I ask people what they think of when they hear 'missionary' I receive responses such as 'A full-time person dedicated to spreading the Gospel overseas' or something along those lines. But what if I told you that you are a missionary as well, regardless of your vocation, regardless of your age, and regardless of where you live?

Prior to the fall of 2010 I wouldn't have considered myself a missionary either, but I met Ellie Menz and she invited me to go to California with her on the IOWAY mission trip. The trip truly changed my life. I didn't know anyone going on the trip and, to be honest, was a little nervous about spending two weeks with total strangers.

Those complete strangers turned into friends for a lifetime. I met my dear friend Hannah, who attends Concordia Chicago; Steven, who is a national FFA vice-president; Kayla, who attends Concordia Nebraska; Mac, who lives and works in the Des Moines area; and numerous others that I still think about every day.

The people who went on the trip are great people to know, but the people we worked with also had an impact on my life. I remember working on Skid Row, where there are around 7,000 homeless people, a man came up to me and we talked a little. He said, 'The best thing you can do for yourself is to keep your faith and graduate high school.'

"Interesting words from a homeless man! I didn't take the words to heart at first, but later that night I thought about the conversation we had. Being only a sophomore in high school at the time, I had no plans of dropping out of high school, but I thought to myself what could I do to help others keep the faith and show them the importance of education.


"I thought about being a teacher, but that really wasn't for me. I am going to be a Director of Christian Education (DCE) because I like the educational aspect of the ministry.

I am a student at CUNE (Concordia at Seward, NE) and have enjoyed every minute of it!

"I continued to go on mission trips throughout high

school. I went to California two more times and was part of the first IOWAY group to go to Haiti. I fell in love with the country and the people who had been devastated by so much. My heart was broken by the poverty, the need for decent housing and the need for food.

"When our team returned to Iowa, we told Ellie, 'We have to do something! We have to feed the children!' After much thought


and prayer, ETCH (Education To Change Haiti) was set up. Details are at: www.idwlcms.org under "Ministry Areas-IOWAY-ETCH." It is awesome that at this time 115 children have been sponsored by IDW individuals and/or churches. Please consider sponsoring a child. It will change their life!

"I just returned from my second trip and was amazed at the improvement.

"When we first drove up the road to the guesthouse I was in shock at the new buildings that had been or were in the process of being built. What I remember as a large open field where Haitians who lived in the neighborhood played, a makeshift soccer field was turned into a much smaller plot of land because of new buildings. The new homes are great because 1) it's someone's job to make the cinder blocks to put up the home; 2) it's someone's job to put the building together; 3) it's someone's job to paint the building; 4) a family gets a new house to live in.

"Jobs are important in Haiti. Haitians are very hard workers; the problem is many don't have anything to do. While in Haiti, our team put the finishing touches on a new orphanage. There were many Haitians working on the project, some of whom were there to volunteer because it was something to do. You could see Haitians (some of them were young) mixing cement, moving blocks, putting cement on the walls, painting, and everything in between.

"While we were waiting for the painter to bring paint, some of us helped the Haitians sift rock/sand that was being mixed into the concrete. They had these big piles of different size rock that had to be hand sifted to

get the right texture (thick for foundation cement, smoother for finishing walls). Imagine this – it's over hot (enough said), 100% humidity, a blazing sun, and I was moving shovels full of rock into an 10" by 12" screen that a 14-year-old Haitian was operating. Needless to say, he could sift faster than I could move the rock. What an experience!

"I'm looking forward to what the Lord has in store for me in the future, but the Lord has big things in store for you as well. Wherever you are in life, we are called to serve the Lord - we are all missionaries in the Lord's kingdom. Remember the Great Commission from the words of Matthew – 'Go, therefore, and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit."
