

In this September Newsletter article I would like to speak and write about the three ecumenical creeds; The Apostles' Creed, The Nicene Creed, and The Athanasian Creed. These three creeds were instrumental in the Christian faith. These three creeds show that Martin Luther and those who were with him in the Reformation did not teach or come up with anything new or different than what was taught in the past. Please read below to see what Lutherans believe regarding to the Three Ecumenical Creeds. Today, September 2015, we don't come up with anything new or different than hasn't already been taught through the centuries before us. We stand on the shoulders of those who have gone before us and taught and confessed the faith. You can rejoice that as our world changes from minute to minute, hour to hour, day by day, week by week, month by month, year by year this Christian faith does not change. This is why we hold to the Christian faith as it has been handed down from generation to generation. Because the world changes all the time, but this Christian faith does not change. This should give us comfort, because we have a God and a Savior who does not change. ***Hebrews 13:7-9; ⁷ Remember your leaders, those who spoke to you the word of God. Consider the outcome of their way of life, and imitate their faith. ⁸ Jesus Christ is the same yesterday and today and forever. ⁹ Do not be led away by diverse and strange teachings, for it is good for the heart to be strengthened by grace, not by foods, which have not benefited those devoted to them.***

AN OVERVIEW OF THE BOOK OF CONCORD

The Book of Concord contains documents Christians have used since the fourth century to explain what they believe and teach on the basis of the Holy Scriptures. First, it includes the three creeds that originated in the Ancient Church: the Apostles' Creed, the Nicene Creed, and the Athanasian Creed.

I. The Creeds

The Apostles' Creed was not composed by the apostles but is a faithful Confession of apostolic doctrine; it is a "daughter" of the creed used by early Christians in Rome. The wording of the creed, as we confess it today, can be traced to southern Gaul (France).

The Nicene Creed is spoken today in many Lutheran congregations during Communion services or festive occasions. It was formulated by the Council of Nicaea (AD 325) and revised by the Council of Constantinople (AD 381). (This popular history has been challenged. Another theory is that the creed had its roots in the creed of Jerusalem adopted by Epiphanius of Cyprus.) One addition to the original formula—that the Holy Spirit proceeds from the Father "and the Son" Western in origin and appears as early as the Synod of Toledo (AD 589).

The Athanasian Creed is the longest of the three. Though included in Lutheran hymnals, many congregations use it only on Trinity Sunday (the First Sunday after Pentecost). It is named after Athanasius, the great fourth-century champion of orthodoxy against heretics who denied the deity of Christ. The creed originated in southern Gaul, probably about the middle of the sixth century.

The inclusion of the three ancient creeds in the Book of Concord shows that Lutherans are not a sect but that they embrace and confess the ancient and orthodox faith.

EDITOR'S INTRODUCTION TO THE ECUMENICAL CREEDS

Lutheranism is not a new faith, but a continuation of the historic, Christian faith of all times and places. In this sense Lutheranism is *catholic*, a word that comes from two Greek words, meaning “according to the whole.” With Christians of all times, and in all places, we confess what God’s Word teaches—nothing more, and nothing less.

For this reason, it was important for the Lutheran laymen at Augsburg to make it clear to the emperor that they fully accepted the ancient creeds of the Church. The Augsburg Confession refers to “the Fathers,” a reference to formative teachers in the history of the Church, most notably the Early Church Fathers who lived and worked between the first and fifth centuries. Lutheranism embraces this history as its own—but with discernment. Lutheranism does not regard the traditions and teachings of the Fathers of the Church as equal to Scripture, but always subject to evaluation in light of Scripture.

Neither Martin Luther nor any of his colleagues ever claimed to be starting a new church. Such a thought was the farthest thing from their minds. They regarded those on the sectarian side of the Reformation as radicals and revolutionaries. They continually condemned almost everything these radicals stood for. Lutheranism is not about revolution, but reformation. It is not about throwing away the past, but about retaining and preserving the best, while filtering out whatever covers and contradicts God’s Word.

The Lutherans never wanted to reject and rebel against the Roman Church. They were, however, held captive by the force of the clear truth of God’s Word. They refused to compromise that truth. They denied the claim by Rome that it was in fact the “true Church.” They regarded Romanism to be a deep corruption of the genuine Church catholic (universal) of the New Testament and of the Early Fathers of the Church. The claim of “catholicity” was reserved by the Lutherans only for that which was biblically true, not what was merely a long-honored tradition within the Roman Church. Many years after being forced out of fellowship with Rome, Martin Luther finally let his name be associated with his teachings by speaking of “Lutheranism.”

The most ancient of all Confessions of faith in the Western Church are the Apostles’ Creed, the Nicene Creed, and the Athanasian Creed. The texts and translations conform with those in the hymnal *Lutheran Service Book*.

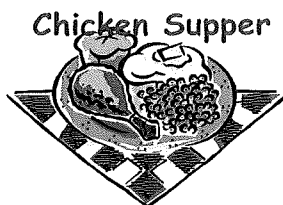

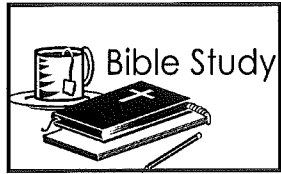

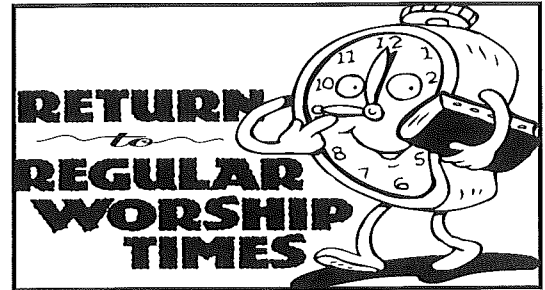
ADULT BIBLE CLASS

The "Back to School" sales have started and this is a great time to help the Ladies Aid with their "School Kit" Mission Project.

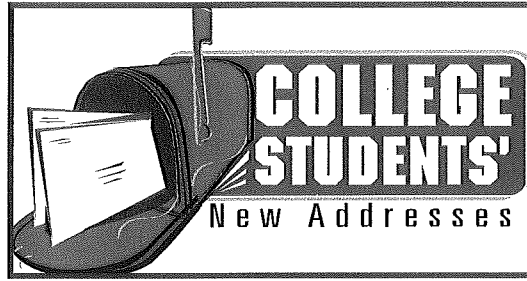
