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#Go Higher!

Where Christian faith, life experiences and excellent academics intersect to equip you for life.

CUNE (Concordia University Nebraska) located in Seward, Nebraska is where excellent academics intersect with Christian beliefs and the Lutheran tradition in a supportive community. CUNE is a member of the Concordia system of The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod. This is what the CUNE website states; but how does that look in the real world? How does that look in the lives of students and professors?

First of all, from my personal experience as an alumni of CUNE, I have experienced the uniqueness of CUNE. When I attended, it was called CTC, Concordia Teachers College. Since its humble beginning in 1894, many students have been touched by the warm friendliness at a great college in the middle of farm country. One might think that the majority of the students are from Nebraska, but the facts show that students currently enrolled at CUNE are from 43 states.

CUNE offers undergraduate, graduate and online classes.

What do the students say about their college experience? I organized an opportunity for Iowa District West high school students to experience a college visit day on March 16. Nine high school youth and six parents took the opportunity to visit. We started the event at the Cobblestone Motel at Seward on Thursday evening. We had an informal get together for sharing information and an opportunity to ask questions. Five current CUNE students and Daisha Thomas, admissions counselor, shared their thoughts, impressions, experiences and advice for incoming students. Their main suggestions were:

- Work hard in high school and get good grades. Good grades in high school equates to larger scholarships.
- Apply for every scholarship that is available. Be sure to apply for the lucrative Iowa District West scholarship each year.
- Live broke. Work as much as you can during the summer and part time jobs in college so you don't go too far into debt.
- Take the ACT more than once. The higher your score, the more scholarships you can receive.
- Take AP (Advanced Placement) courses in high school. That saves money. One student shared that
 she graduated from high school with 31 college credits and started at Concordia University as a
 sophomore.
- Initially, the cost of attending a Christian college appears to be too expensive; but many students



shared that the final costs were similar to the costs at a state university after taking the financial aid packages into consideration.


On Friday, March 16, the Iowa District West parents and students spent the day exploring the campus, going to chapel, visiting with faculty and coaches, and discussing financial options. At the end of the day, I asked for their impressions of the college. Everything was positive except for the rainy and windy weather! The following was listed when asked what impressed them the most about the campus: chapel, noon meal at dining

hall, the people, the aesthetic campus, number of buildings, music and art buildings, perfect size, felt like home, soccer team, and friendly atmosphere.

The friendly atmosphere is genuine and many mentioned that. One comment made by a professor is that when alumni return to the campus for a visit, they feel like they came home. I agree with that. Once I get into Seward and turn north onto Columbia Avenue, the feeling hits me. It's a place where life-long friendships are made. On a personal note, even after all the many years since I graduated, I am still in contact with three of my roommates.

During our visit on Friday, I randomly approached five students, introduced myself and asked what they appreciate about Concordia and/or the community of Seward. Following are the responses:

- Seward is like a small slice of home. Far enough from home, but close enough to still go home often. High school is so regimented and in college you have freedom to choose what you do and for some people it is a challenge because they don't know at first how to handle that freedom. Some students skip classes and others go to every class. It is up to you to decide what you want out of college and what you want for your life.
- In the work world you don't have the opportunity to skip. Show up or you don't have a job. College is training for the work world.
- Seward purposely strives to be a close knit community. They achieve it because the students, professors and community work together to make the students feel welcome.
- I love that Seward is a smaller town but has a lot to offer. Love the faith aspect of the community.
- The atmosphere is warm and welcoming. There is a smiling and welcoming feel at Concordia and Seward.



After the college visit activities, the Iowa parents and students headed home because of the rain and potentially icy roads. Rhonda Mohr, IDW Executive for Education, Youth and Family Life, and I were tough. We stayed to host a pizza party at Godfather's Pizza for

the current IDW students attending at CUNE. Pictured is part of the group who enjoyed the free pizza. We host this each year to let them know that we appreciate them. Iowa District West each year gives a significant scholarship to IDW students going into both church and non-church professions. I was told that IDW is known at CUNE as the district that generously supports their students with scholarships!

Each year it is special for me to make this opportunity available for high school students. This year was extra special because I learned that Professor Dr. Duensing (pictured) is living in Seward. I have not seen him since the day I graduated from college. In one of my classes as a sophomore, we were paired with a "special friend." Mine was Mike, Dr. Duensing's third grade son. I was often invited to join their family for a meal. It was great to visit with the Duensings and to learn that Mike is now a retired Navy Seal. Wow, I wonder if any of his life skills were learned as he and I shared bike rides, went out for ice cream, went bowling and just had fun together. CUNE, for me, truly was a place to make life-long friends.


Senior and Junior High Youth Gatherings





ABOUT THE PRESENTERS



Bob Johnson served as the Director of Safety and Security for Christ's Church of the Valley in Peoria, Arizona from 2005-2017. His core responsibility was leading a team of more than 350 staff and volunteers, ensuring the protection of 9 campuses with a total of more than 30,000 in weekly attendance.

For the past 47 years, Mr. Johnson has been actively involved in both public and private sector security. Concurrent with part of this experience, he spent 20 years in the Arizona Army National Guard, reaching the rank of Command Sergeant Major. His military time culminated with assignment to the Arizona Military Academy overseeing leadership and management training for the State's Officers and NCOs.

For 10 of his 23 years with the Phoenix Police Department, Bob was a Detective with the Organized Crime Bureau. He became proficient in complex multi-agency investigations, working side by side with the FBI, IRS, Secret Service, DEA and other agencies to infiltrate and unravel money laundering, narcotics, gambling, prostitution, fraud, murder for hire and many other state and federal crimes. Bob also served as the Director of Security for Domino's Pizza's second largest franchisee and was responsible for 85 stores in Arizona.

In addition to his responsibilities at Christ's Church of the Valley, he actively assists other churches as they identify, recruit, train and deploy their safety and security teams. Since 2010, Bob has traveled the United States conducting safety and security seminars and threat/vulnerability assessments for churches. In more than 200 training events, Bob has instructed more than 15,000 people from all 50 states and Canada.

Bob has been married for 46 years and has two children and six grandchildren all living in the Phoenix area.



Bob Wild served as the Director of Finance and Administration and Risk Management for two mega churches in the Phoenix area for more than 25 years: Vineyard Christian Fellowship and Christ's Church of the Valley. He has served on several boards including the local Phoenix NACBA chapter, CCV Youth Sports Inc., the largest nonprofit youth sports program in Arizona, and Financial Planning Ministry, a national estate planning ministry to the local church.

Bob wrote and self-published an instruction manual for church planters called *Growing Your Church From The Ground Up: The Corporate Side*. Bob has been published in Church Executive Magazine, Christianity Today, and Group Publishing's professional edition for their Children's Magazine.

In 2009, Bob joined the team at Brotherhood Mutual Insurance Company as the Sr. Director of Strategic Alliances. He holds degrees in Criminal Justice and Psychology from the University of Wisconsin and a Master's Degree in Business. Bob has four children and three grandchildren.





TOPIC

The Book of Exodus as Story and Gospel

The book of Exodus is foundational to the Bible's redemptive story which finds its climax and fulfillment in Jesus Christ. Its vivid episodes stand as an enduring revelation of the character of the God of Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob, and as rich resources for reflecting on his typical works and ways. Bitter servitude; Moses the mediator and deliverer; burning bush; works of power and judgment; cloud and fire; dry path through the sea; manna and water from the rock; warring Amalekites and welcoming Jethro; meeting with God at Sinai; covenant and commandments; golden calf and near-disaster; and tabernacle with priesthood, altar, and ark. In lecture and discussion, Professor Egger will examine literary/narrative dimensions of Exodus with an emphasis on theological implications and Gospel proclamation.



PRSENTER

Reverend Thomas Egger has served as a professor of Old Testament at Concordia Seminary since 2005. His areas of expertise include biblical Hebrew, the book of Exodus, Old Testament Christ-typology, narrative and rhetorical analysis, and the nature and authority of Scripture. He has made contributions in the area of American Lutheran history, especially the history of the LCMS and its first president, Dr. C.F.W. Walther. He is interested in the theology of Luther's catechisms and the intersection of the catechism and the Bible in Lutheran teaching and piety. He currently serves on the LCMS Commission on Theology and Church Relations and on the Board of Directors for Providence Classical Christian Academy in St. Louis. A native of Muscatine, Iowa, Tom served as pastor at Zion Lutheran Church in rural Storm Lake, Iowa from 2000 to 2005.

OUR MISSION

We strive to be the Health Care Provider of Choice and the Employer of Choice by understanding and meeting the special needs of our Residents, Families, and Employees.

To provide services in a way that includes family involvement, promoting and maximizing the independence and dignity of every Resident.

BOLD VISION

Eventide has served residents requiring skilled nursing care or memory support in a setting that originated in models best described as "institutional medical model." Our current fifty-four year old nursing facility features over 50% of shared resident rooms, shared shower/bathing rooms, long corridors, very centralized space, with limited living space which were all among the standards of this once popular model of care. In response to the ever changing needs of seniors and their expectations as they age, the institutional model of care must be eliminated to create a more home-like setting where the care is directed by the specific needs of each resident.

Over the years, Eventide has set the standard for senior care. Now during our boldest move yet, our vision is to; 1- build a replacement Skilled Nursing Facility, 2- add to our continuum by building Memory Support Assisted Living, and 3- incorporating the Household Model of resident-directed care within both.

MEMORY SUPPORT ASSISTED LIVING

The Household Model is a bold departure from the traditional medical model both in design of



the physical setting and in aspects of operations. This model is redefining senior living and much like the name implies, it brings with it elements that focus on a lifestyle and environment that is similar to the home they have always lived in. The evidence shows that people in households have a higher quality of life and there is a higher continuity of care between caregiver and resident.

In order to bring these new households to life, we will adjust to a new resident-directed staffing model. Our desire for resident-directed living and to empower our team members to make decisions at the level closest to the issues is at the heart of the decision to construct households on our campus. We will transform the life and work that happens within these buildings, bringing a true culture change that can be seen and felt by those in the facility. Positions such as dietary aids, laundry assistants and housekeepers for example will become a cross-trained team of people serving as "hosts". These changes empower our versatile workers to make decisions and allow our residents the freedom of "choice".

SKILLED NURSING FACILITY




BOLD DESIGN

Senior Living design is changing to bring greater individuality, community, dignity and respect to our residents. An Eventide transition to fully capture the household design is dependent upon the creation of new facilities for skilled care and memory support. The following are the most critical design elements of each:

- private resident rooms
- households dedicated to memory care
- private outdoor courtyards
- family spaces
- kitchen wifhin household
- shorter distance in household
- greater resident dignity and privacy
- resident and staff empowerment
- increased socialization









*Some elements of the proposed design may be altered.

Outside of the residents' households one can stroll 'to town' when they need something not normally find in a home. Our town, or as we call it, Main Street, will be the connecting piece to all of the households. Here you will find services such as a Beauty Shop, Library and Rehabilitation Therapy. For greater family and visitor interaction, the Lounges or Snack Bar provide a space to socialize. The highlight of Main Street would be in the Activity Center where residents can attend church services, watch a movie, or hear their favorite entertainer.

As a local leader in Rehabilitation Therapy, it is important to strengthen our services by allowing for more space and additional equipment. Instead of going to a city to receive these services, a resident or community member will have access to top of the line therapy in their own backyard.

BOLD FUNDING

Eventide leaders are taking bold steps to create facilities that will adequately serve multiple generations of future residents. A substantial financial investment in facilities, programs and people is required to transform our community's health care future.

Eventide proposes to construct an 80-bed skilled nursing facility and a 16-bed memory support assisted living. The skilled nursing facility would be built on Eventide's current campus, on land formerly occupied by the Crawford County Hospital; and the 16-bed memory support assisted living would adjoin Silveridge Assisted Living facility.






