

### Catechesis

I want to write this month about catechesis. Catechesis is the funny word that we have been using here for 6 years. It has been somewhat of an undertaking to look deeper at catechesis. Catechesis is primarily concerned with "faith in Christ". Catechesis is not concerned with facts and figures and historical knowledge, but it focuses on Christ crucified for the forgiveness of sins and his resurrection from the dead. This is the shift of thinking in catechesis. Catechesis involves doing things that a Christian will do their entire life long, from infant baptism to eternal glory. Catechesis involves itself with preaching the law and gospel, so the sinful heart is converted from unbelief to faith in Christ.

Catechesis is something that is important the whole Christian *life* long. The summer is a great time to refresh your time with the catechism. It is a great time to get back into doing devotions with the Bible and the catechism. Every aspect of life is found in the catechism. There isn't anything in this life the catechism does not answer. Spend some time getting to know the catechism primary texts—the Bible passages the 6 chief parts come from—and also get to know the secondary texts—meanings written by Martin Luther. Make the catechism part of your everyday thinking. Once you learn the texts by heart, the text of the catechism can become part of your everyday life and thinking. It will be beneficial to you to learn by heart the catechism or learn it by heart again.

Also this summer it can be great time to read books on the faith. You can read books that explain something you have never understood or why we do things the way we do. There are so many good theologically rich books out right now, sometimes it overwhelms me with all the reading I'd like to get done. If you have any questions about what to read with recommendations I have plenty! ©

In closing, take this summer to grow in your faith. Read the Bible more, read the catechism, read theological books with great depth to grow in your faith in Christ.





Over the years, Memorial Day has become a big holiday weekend. It's now the unofficial start of summer, rather than a day of tribute to the departed it was originally meant to be.

Even if we plan fun events for Memorial Day weekend, it's important to stop long enough to bow our heads and pay respect to our departed loved ones — especially those who fell in battle while helping preserve America's liberties.

Let us take time to make the pilgrimage to various cemeteries and pause long enough to say, "Thank you, Father, for these special lives, for sacrifices made and for friendships we have shared."

### The price of freedom

In the song "What Did He Die For?" Twila Paris reminds us why we observe Memorial Day — and why we worship Jesus as our Savior. The first verse tells of a 21-year-old soldier fighting for America's freedom during World War II. The second verse recalls another young man, many centuries prior, sent by his Father to win eternal freedom from sin for the entire world.

The chorus offers this challenge:

"What did he die for when he died for you and me,

Made the sacrifice so that we could all be free?

I believe we will answer each to heaven

For the way we spend a priceless liberty.

Look inside and ask the question, What did he die for?"

Memorial Day challenges us to live so as to honor the sacrifices made by members of the military. We value our freedom because of the heavy price people have paid for it. Likewise, every day we're challenged to live so as to honor Jesus' supreme sacrifice. He calls us to spend our "priceless liberty" using our blessings to bless others.

### How will they know?

A well-known 1960s song by Peter Scholtes answers an implied question: How will others know we're Jesus' disciples? Not by how we understand family values. Not by our politics or theology. Not by how many Bible verses we've memorized, how often we attend church or how much offering we give.

Rather, the song's title and refrain say it all: "They'll know we are Christians by our love." Jesus put it this way: "Everyone will know that you are my disciples, if you love one another" (John 13:35, NIV).

Sometimes love involves words — teaching, proclaiming, bearing witness to God's presence. But if words aren't backed by actions, they soon fall flat. We can, as



### Teen Entrepreneurs on a Mission



What a privilege it is to meet and work with people who truly want to help others! It is especially fun to work with and encourage young people as they look for ways to reach out to others. I had that honor, recently, when I met an amazing family, Ann Goth and her two daughters, Kaitlyn and Kristina. It started with a phone call, emails, texts and then a wonderful visit with them at our home as they delivered

the beautiful hygiene kits they made for the homeless. How did Kristina, a high school freshman, get so interested in making hygiene kits? Here's her story:

"Whatever you do for the least of these brothers of mine, you do for me." Matthew 25:40

In today's world, there aren't a lot of people who live by this verse, but I have been blessed to meet a few who do. I first started sewing when I was in 1st grade and fell in love with the art. I started by making doll clothes and have built up to making quilts. When I was in 5th grade, at 4-H state judging day, I met a judge who wanted to take my sister and me under her wing. She became our mentor and has helped us with many projects, including the IOWAY hygiene kit project.

The kits are simple but for the people who receive them, they are life changing. They are made out of a hand towel with pockets sewn into it. A ribbon is then sewn onto the side to hold it all together when it is rolled up. They are then stuffed full of toiletries such as a washcloth, shampoo, deodorant, a toothbrush, etc. When I first heard about the hygiene kits, I was immediately excited and wanted to make them. I first made one for a friend for her birthday and haven't looked back since.

When I first started making the kits, I knew they would be going to the homeless. My 4-H mentor got the pattern from another lady in her church who had actually given the kits to the homeless in Los Angeles.

I starting making as many kits as I could. Over Christmas break, I even set up my own workshop in my home and invited some of my friends to help. I quickly found that it was very expensive to make them. To solve this problem, I decided to make some kits to sell to my friends and other people in my community. They could use them after sporting events or when traveling. I made

some with my school colors and took them to the local t- shirt shop and had them embroider our school logo onto them. I sold these for \$20. That price included a kit that was stuffed and tied with a bow and a special tag with the above Bible verse.

There was a \$5-6 profit, enough to purchase more towels to make a kit for the homeless. I learned that if I made the kits, other people with IOWAY would fill them. I advertised this project on Facebook promoting the kit for personal use in addition to helping one homeless person with their purchase. I immediately found people to support me.

My mini nonprofit business took off and kept me busy. In my spare time when I wasn't doing homework, I was sewing or going with my mom to the Dollar Store to buy supplies. As more people heard about my project, I received special requests from people from neighboring schools to make kits with names on it or their school logo. In total, I sold 70 kits. Keeping to my 1 to 1 ratio, I also made 70 kits for the homeless for a grand total of 140!

I was excited to learn more about where the kits were going and I couldn't wait to meet my 4-H mentor's friend. We met over supper and she told me stories of delivering the homeless kits. She said one of the main places that IOWAY delivers the kits is a place called Skid Row.

On Skid Row you will find 7,000-8,000 homeless people. The homeless live on the street or in makeshift tents. The living conditions are bad. However, in the midst of all of that suffering, there is still a ray of hope. The Union Rescue Mission is a nonprofit Christian organization that offers shelter to many. They have many programs to help the homeless. They provide 1,500 meals three times a day and never turn anyone away.


Every year IOWAY sends a group of 30 people called the Petal Pushers to Pasadena to help decorate floats for the Rose Bowl Parade. While in California, they spend a day on Skid Row. They serve a meal and distribute socks, hats, suitcases, hygiene kits, underwear, and Christian booklets. They deliver up to 1,500 kits per year to Skid Row and more to other homeless outreaches.

Inspired by the new information, I wanted to learn even more about the program and other programs IOWAY has to offer. My mom contacted the director of IOWAY, Ellie Menz, and set up a time for us to meet her and give her the 70 kits.

I met Ellie and her husband at their home in Jefferson. We were greeted with many smiles and a plate of cookies. The two retired teachers were very welcoming and kind. I enjoyed listening to all

of their inspiring stories. They told me more about the trip to Skid Row and even invited me to come along sometime! I also learned more about the many different opportunities that IOWAY has to offer. We left their home inspired to do more.

These people in my life have inspired me to do more for others and to spread God's Word and love through my actions. I encourage each of you to turn away from what the world teaches and turn instead to what Jesus teaches us. Reach out to others because you are also doing it for Him. You will never know the great impact even the smallest actions for others can do.





### **TOPIC**

### The Book of Exodus as Story and Gospel

The book of Exodus is foundational to the Bible's redemptive story which finds its climax and fulfillment in Jesus Christ. Its vivid episodes stand as an enduring revelation of the character of the God of Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob, and as rich resources for reflecting on his typical works and ways. Bitter servitude; Moses the mediator and deliverer; burning bush; works of power and judgment; cloud and fire; dry path through the sea; manna and water from the rock; warring Amalekites and welcoming Jethro; meeting with God at Sinai; covenant and commandments; golden calf and near-disaster; and tabernacle with priesthood, altar, and ark. In lecture and discussion, Professor Egger will examine literary/narrative dimensions of Exodus with an emphasis on theological implications and Gospel proclamation.



### **PRSENTER**

Reverend Thomas Egger has served as a professor of Old Testament at Concordia Seminary since 2005. His areas of expertise include biblical Hebrew, the book of Exodus, Old Testament Christ-typology, narrative and rhetorical analysis, and the nature and authority of Scripture. He has made contributions in the area of American Lutheran history, especially the history of the LCMS and its first president, Dr. C.F.W. Walther. He is interested in the theology of Luther's catechisms and the intersection of the catechism and the Bible in Lutheran teaching and piety. He currently serves on the LCMS Commission on Theology and Church Relations and on the Board of Directors for Providence Classical Christian Academy in St. Louis. A native of Muscatine, Iowa, Tom served as pastor at Zion Lutheran Church in rural Storm Lake, Iowa from 2000 to 2005.



That's why we have worship services and Bible studies, programs and ministries—that people might come to believe and then be prepared to go plant. You see, all those things are fine but oftentimes today people won't come into our churches. We need to also go out to them. That's why God gives us relationships — wonderful opportunities to sow the seed of God's Word and bring eternal life to others!

Let's take our cue from the farmers and get busy planting. Here's what we can do:

Pray – to the Lord of the harvest that He might guide and bless our efforts, opening our eyes to the opportunities;

Prepare the "fields" – showing grace to another person can soften their heart and prepare them to hear what we will share;

Plant – as the opportunities present themselves, share God's Word and let the Holy Spirit work!

I'll be praying for you at 10:02 every morning when my alarm on my phone goes off reminding me of Luke 10:2, "Pray earnestly to the Lord of the harvest to send out laborers [professional and laity] into His harvest." Why not set your alarm and join me in prayer — but let's not stop there!

## Senior and Junior High Youth Gatherings


