Closed* Communion vs. Open Communion

This newsletter article is one that as a pastor, as your pastor is hard to write. But as your pastor one who is responsible for feeding and caring for the souls entrusted to me by God it is my responsibility to write this. I have noticed many times over the course of serving here that there are family members who come back and are receive Holy Communion here at Zion. Some of those family members have been baptized and catechized here at Zion, and some were married here as well. Some of these family members have joined other churches' membership rolls after leaving Zion. Here comes the hard part. Once they publicly confess their faith in agreement with other church bodies, they give up their publicly confessed faith in what Zion Lutheran Church and The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod believes, teaches, and confesses. This is an issue that needs to looked at closely.

We have guidelines in The LC-MS we adhere to out of great love and respect for the Bible. God's Word helps us see the theology and practice of closed communion. We desire all people to come to the Lord's Supper understanding who they are in relationship to Christ, what is offered in the Lord's Supper, and how this meal shows unity of faith and doctrine with one another. There are many differences with what other churches teach and what we believe in regards to the Lord's Supper. We desire people to receive it for their benefit and not to their spiritual harm. For instance if you were to go to a pharmacy in Carroll, you would see there are certain medicines that are locked behind the counter for the protection of people. If certain medicines were given to the wrong patients the results could be very harmful, even deadly. So pharmacists do not give out any medicine to anyone, but they give medicine which is specifically for this or that ailment. So it is with the Lord's Supper. We don't give it out freely, but give it to those who need it for a particular ailment, the forgiveness of sins.

I know in this day and age it seems hurtful and unloving to deny Holy Communion to anyone who comes to the altar. But we practice closed communion out of love for Christ. We don't want to be seen as the unloving church to our neighbor and friends, but we must do what is right in accordance with scripture. It has been the practice of the church since the beginning to practice communion in this way. *We practice a "closeness" at our communion rail because we sincerely believe that this is what the Word of God teaches and what God would have us do with his Son's precious body and blood. Closed communion is not meant to be a judgmental practice, in the sense that we are condemning people. It is a practice which preserves and upholds the truth and power of the Sacrament. It is a practice which we Lutherans feel protects those who do not believe the same things as we do. It is a practice which recognizes that a person's church membership does mean something. To belong to a church means to confess what that church believes and confesses. To commune at a church's altar is the highest expression of confessing oneness with what that church teaches. A person must determine for oneself if what one's church teaches is what the Word of God teaches. We respect each individual's decision in this matter, but we cannot in good conscience create the impression that differences between churches are of no significance. Because the differences between churches concern the Gospel of our Savior Jesus Christ, we know that the differences are important and do matter. This is why we choose to practice closed communion, a practice which is found in the historic, orthodox Lutheran Church since the time of the Reformation and a practice which can be traced back to the very early years of the Christian church. We hope that our beliefs will be respected by those who differ with us. We certainly do not intend to offend anyone or do we wish to create ill-will and hurt feelings. Hopefully, this brief explanation will help you or someone else understand that our love for the Sacrament, and our love for the individual, are the motivations for our practice of closed communion.





Miraculous Mission

"Miraculous Mission" (CPH) was the theme of the 2019 Vacation Bible School at Zion Lutheran Church in Arcadia. The goals for the annual program are to fulfill the reaching, teaching and discipling mission; to involve members to grow as Christians; to provide Christian education for our church's children; and to encourage children to bring their friends to learn about Jesus. It was held Tuesday to Saturday June 4-8th 2019 with the closing program at noon on Saturday. Students who are four years old (preschool) by the first day of VBS through the eighth grade were enrolled. A total of 135 youngsters were involved throughout the week. The Bible theme for the week was "

"For God so loved the world, that He gave His only Son, that whoever believes in Him should not perish but have eternal life." John 3:16

The sessions ran from 8:30 to 11:30 each day with opening and closing devotions in the church led by Pastor Ben Dose and music instruction by Tammi Brunner.

"Our offering collected this year went towards our mission project of "Sharing God's Mighty Word"

We will be sending books to kids. Sharing God's Mighty Word is an outreach project that sends Bible based story books to kids around the US. The project focuses on reaching inner city kids, Hispanic kids, Native American kids and kids in crisis. Our goal was \$500...we surpassed that and raised a total of \$747.00 which will proved 1,120 books.

By getting our students involved in this project, we are teaching them and the kids they help serve that God values all people regardless of race, ethnicity, or social status We are teaching that God reaches out especially to those who are suffering, that He doesn't forget them, that He loves them. And we are teaching that they can be missionaries in their own communities.

Deb Owen assisted with the secretarial needs and newly confirmed teens, other church members and their friends assisted in all areas of need. Scott Linde and Allan Kock made the woodworking projects.

Stacie Muhlbauer provided the craft project ideas. The 5th-8th graders also did an outstanding job of tying **52** quilts this year. Since 1993, VBS students have tied over **875 quilts**. The ladies prepare all the materials for the quilts and the students tie them using the two frames that keep all the helpers hopping. There are **many**, **many** helpers who volunteer each day both with the crafts and the snacks.

It is truly appreciated how everyone comes forth each year for the week of Vacation Bible School. Thanks to Curtis Ehlers for the donuts on Tuesday. Parents assisted with Rice Krispie Bars and cookies for the rest of the week It is a fun week and hopefully, memories are created that will last a lifetime.





September 23-27, 2019





Flood Relief Update

- Thank you for the continuing donations for flood relief! The most recent purchases with money donated to IDW was for nearly \$10,000 for sheetrock, tape and mud to help as people start to rebuild after the flooding.
- Thank you to all who have served meals and worked in the distribution center in Glenwood.
- Thank you to all who worked in Pacific Junction to clean out the mess that the flooding caused!
- Thank you to youth group members of Trinity Lutheran Church, Coon Rapids and Pastor Allan Miller as they helped at Glenwood and Pacific Junction.

Brenda Heithoff reports, "Youth group leaders Michelle Shirbroun and Brenda Heithoff and youth group member Ella Heithoff volunteered at the Glenwood Resource Center. While in Glenwood, the youth group also delivered frozen meals and desserts made by members of Trinity Lutheran Church to the Resource Center to use in future weeks. After assisting with lunch, Michelle, Brenda



and Ella placed 'kindness rocks' they had painted around Glenwood Lake Park where a fundraiser for the residents of Pacific Junction was to be held later that afternoon.

Youth group members Kaleb and Lucas Shirbroun and Chase, Colby and Corey Heithoff teamed up with Trinity Lutheran Church Pastor Alan Miller and Iowa State University senior Josh Peter of Dedham to help with flood clean up in the town of Pacific Junction. The Trinity Lutheran Church group spent their day in Pacific Junction gutting the town's flooded EMS building. Due to the possibility of contamination, the crew had to wear high rubber boots and masks while working. A Salvation Army food truck rolled into town at lunchtime to feed the volunteers and Pacific Junction residents. By mid-afternoon, almost the entire EMS building had been cleaned out.

Josh: "It was an incredible experience to see the damage inflicted by the floods. Lending our little bit of help to the recovery effort gave me a greater appreciation of life and the power of community."

Kaleb: "When we see this kind of destruction on TV we usually only see the outside of the homes and buildings. Until the water recedes and you step inside and see the damage with your own eyes, you can't imagine how truly devastating 12 feet of water is."

Ella: "I was shocked to see the flood damage and was so grateful that I could help and wish I could help more."

Corey: "I have never experienced anything like that before. The flood waters had destroyed the entire town of Pacific Junction. I'm glad I could help with the clean-up."

Michelle: "When FEMA pulled out to go to the next crisis, Pacific Junction was left a ghost town. Almost every window in every house was broken from the impact of the water. There were piles of debris everywhere - it was heartbreaking. I wish we could have done more."


Pastor Miller: "I very much appreciate and thank God for the group we had volunteer, for the ladies and Ella helping with the meal and kindness rocks, and the great bunch of hardworking guys on the Pacific Junction crew. They went at it full speed ahead and accomplished a lot more than I expected they would. I think we were the first ones in the EMS building and the task looked impossible. But the guys tore into it with no let up and cleared out furniture, cabinets, dry wall and insulation. It was hot, heavy, hard, dirty work, especially all geared up against contamination. The people on site appreciated our day's work. It was a plus to be served a hot meal by the Salvation Army. To serve our neighbor in Christ's name was a blessed opportunity...it was eye opening to see how devastated the flooded areas really are and the people there set back by it all but pushing ahead."


YOUTH AND ADULTS FROM GALVA, IOWA VISIT MISSION CENTRAL


