# PDOSE OF WISCOM



# Foreword to The Lutheran Catechesis Series A Change of Thinking About the Task of Catechesis


The Lutheran Catechesis Series represents a paradigm shift for most Lutheran pastors and congregations in their understanding of what catechesis is, how it is done, and the role of the Small Catechism. <u>For most, catechesis is "confirmation class." It is primarily academic in nature, the goal being to impart a certain body of religious knowledge that is to be mastered before admission to the Lord's Supper.</u> It often involves workbooks, quizzes, and tests, like any other academic course of instruction. While such "academic tools" might be utilized in some of the tasks of catechesis, the main goal of catechesis is the creation and sustaining of faith in Christ, and how that faith expresses itself in the Christian life.

Christians are disciples of Jesus—catechumens—for life, not just for a few years of confirmation instruction. Christians learn from His Word continuously as they sit together at the feet of Jesus' feet in the Christian congregation and in the Christian home. From His Word they learn to believe that they are sinners, they learn repentance, they learn to confess their sins, they learn to trust in Him for the forgiveness of sins, they learn to call on Him in prayer, they learn to confess their faith before the world, they learn to confess their sins to one another, they learn to forgive one another as Christ has forgiven them, and they learn to live faithfully in their vocation as hearers of the Word, husbands, wives, fathers, mothers, citizens of the land, and workers of every kind. The life of faith all flows from the Word of God that is received and believed. Faith in Christ lives from the preaching of the Gospel and the reception of Christ's sacraments (the Divine Service) and this faith expresses itself in the Christian's life of prayer, confessing the faith before the world, confession, and faithfulness in one's vocation (Table of Duties). Catechesis, therefore, involves much more than an "academic endeavor"; it involves doing those things that Christians will continue to do for the rest of their lives. It involves establishing "a culture of hearing the Word of God and prayer" in both the congregation and home. How does a Christian, whose faith is in Christ for the forgiveness of sins, listen to God's Word, receive the Sacrament of the Altar, pray, confess, forgive, and live in his or her vocation? These are the questions of catechesis. When catechesis is approached purely as an "academic endeavor" there is often little connection to the Divine Service, and the Small Catechism becomes only a textbook, rather than a prayer book and handbook for the Christian faith and life. But when a "culture of prayer" is established in which the catechism can be learned by heart as one actually meditates upon the text of the catechism, it can begin to shape the way we think. It can also teach us how to listen to God's Word correctly, what to expect from Him in the Sacraments, how to receive the Sacraments for our blessing, how to pray and confess the faith, and how to live in our vocations. This is how the catechism functions as a handbook and prayer book for the Christian faith and life. Rev. Peter Bender (pg. xi, Lutheran Catechesis Series, Sussex, WI, 2011.)





In the busy times we are currently in, handling the finances of our congregation is requiring more and more work. In an effort to save our financial people time we ask that you consider an old idea, that of the Simply Giving Program. To refresh your memory, Simply Giving is a program where once a week, once a month, or twice a month, your offering is automatically deducted from your checking account and automatically deposited into the churches account. All you will need to do is once a week (or whatever you choose) is to record the amount in your check register. That is all there is to it. The amount is set by you and doesn't change unless you request it to be changed or discontinued. Special services like Advent, Lent, Christmas, etc are NOT automatically deducted and we would encourage you to use your offering envelopes for those services just like in the past. For each person our Financial Secretary has to handle 52 envelopes and bookkeeping entries per year, and when you multiply that by approximately 275 envelope numbers, that is a significant amount of work that could be avoided by using the Simply Giving Program. An additional bonus would be that our giving throughout the year would be more consistent. We prayerfully ask that you consider making this small change that would be of big help. # FROM A FAMILY WHO USES THE "SIMPLY GIVING PROGRAM"

"Simply Giving" is simply easy! If you are hesitant about starting the "Simply Giving" program...don't be! Just decide how much you normally give to church each week (or month) and have it transferred from your banking account to the **church's** account. It is shown on your bank statement and you decide when you want to give each month. It frees your mind as you go to church in that you have given your share and don't have to write a check or look for money each time you go to church. You are REALLY putting the **Lord's** work **first.** You will still have the envelopes and can give more throughout the year. If you are gone the church still receives your contribution. Give it some thought. The more who participate gives the church board the financial support in a more orderly fashion as they will know how much to anticipate each month.

# ENDOWMENT PROJECT SUGGESTIONS

Once again the council is asking the congregation for suggestions on how to spend the money made available from the endowment fund. The endowment fund was started approximately 30 years ago when the Mildred Kasperson estate gave Zion approximately \$100,000 in cash and 160 acres of farmland. At that time it was decided to only spend the interest generated from that cash, and the farm rental income, and to never invade the principle of those funds. The spending of those funds is not to be used for normal budgeted items. Over the years this has been a wonderful blessing to our congregation and the council wants all our members to know that anyone may donate to the endowment fund and any time. This year we will have approximately \$58,000 in unrestricted and \$2,200 in restricted (mission projects) to spend from the endowment fund. Your input in welcomed and encouraged!

# L.I.F.E. - Living in Faith Everyday

# One Word to Describe this Season



Recently, I attended a conference where the speaker was trying to find a word to describe this season of our lives. He invented a new word, PUC. What does PUC mean in good Lutheran fashion? It stands for Pain, Uncertainty, and Chaos. Does that resonate with you? This year, we have seen more than our fair share of three of those. My focus is on the word "chaos." As believers, we have had to learn to live in

the chaos. We like things we can control, but COVID-19 taught us we cannot control the chaos. Rules are in place to help reduce chaos, but rules are often there because someone in the past created chaos. Think back to the year you saw more growth in your life in the chaos. If we avoid chaos, we may limit the growth God has in mind for our life. James reminds us, "Count it all joy, my brothers, when you meet trials of various kinds, for you know that the testing of your faith produces steadfastness. And let steadfastness have its full effect, that you may be perfect and complete, lacking in nothing" (James 1:2-4). My dear brothers and sisters in Christ, do not obsess about those things you have no control over. Instead, focus on the outcome. God uses tough times, even chaotic times, to strengthen our faith.

# A Mission Field of over 600,000 Souls...Embryo Rescue Through Adoption

# Does the idea of rescuing embryos seem a bit strange?

Take a look at the information below to better understand this life-affirming way to build a family and bring little ones at risk of death to Jesus.

## What embryos are we talking about?

Little boys and girls conceived through in vitro fertilization and now frozen in fertility clinics because the couple conceiving them has completed their family. Approximately six percent of the over 600,000 embryo population in America is available for rescue through adoption if only parents could be found to rescue them.

# What options are there for these extra embryos?

They may be donated for research and killed for their stem cells, thawed and allowed to die, or rescued by a couple willing to adopt them.

## How does this rescue process work?

A donating couple is matched with an

adopting couple. The embryos are sent to the adopting couple's fertility clinic and transferred into adopting mom's uterus.

## Who facilitates this?

Lutheran Family Service prepares adopting couples through education and home study, then provides the necessary resources to match adopting couples with donating couples through a partnership with Night Light Christian Adoption's Snowflake Embryo Adoption program.

# Why is this a good alternative to in vitro fertilization?


LFS does not promote IVF, but does believe embryo adoption is a way to rescue little boys and girls who have already been created, bringing them to Holy Baptism and allowing a couple to experience pregnancy and childbirth without creating additional embryos through IVF process.

# What can you do to help rescue these frozen babies?

Pray! Ask God to move couples desiring a child to choose embryo adoption.

Sharel Tell others about these embryos in need of adoption. As God rescued us through adoption (Galatians 4:4-7), so too can we give these children new life through adoption.
