"Dose of Wisdom"

Here we are in the month of November, the month of giving, giving thanks for all the Lord has blessed us with. We thank God for so much that we have received from him. This month's Dose of Wisdom is going to focus on Jesus words of "It is more blessed to give than to receive." Think through these words, meditate on them and see how God has blessed you over this last year and many years.

"In all things I have shown you that by working hard in this way we must help the weak and remember the words of the Lord Jesus, how he himself said, 'It is more blessed to give than to receive.'" (Acts 20:35)

And indeed, it is. Does this not strike a chord that resonates in us all? Which of us can't recall the look of surprise and thanks for the Christmas gifts that we labored to give to those whom we love? And the joy written on their face when that gift is received with thanksgiving means more than all the gifts we have received. It is more blessed to give than to receive.

Our Lord knew this because He practiced it. He gave of Himself – sparing not even His life in death – in order to give us back to our Father in heaven. He knew that in giving you get more because joy is multiplied in giving. The one who receives and the one who gives both rejoice in what is given and received. And, what is more, the one who receives only wants to give back to the one who gave so generously in thanksgiving.

So it is with our tithes and offerings in church. We want to give because we have received from God all that we are and all that we have. Our giving does not originate in what we must do to earn God's favor. We have God's favor because of His gift of His Son, given through Word and Sacrament. Thus, we are made free from the compulsion of giving so that our tithes and offering are freely given in thanksgiving for what God has so generously given to us.

Why then does the church struggle to make budgets? Why does the church always seem stretched so thin when it is the place where God continually gives us His forgiveness of sins? Why does the church struggle when God, out of love for us, generously pours out His grace and mercy?

It is because we are sinners. Our fallen nature makes us selfish and miserly. It leads us to believe that we can have our cake and eat it, too. Because of sin, we want God's grace and mercy; we want His blessings of body and soul. But we don't want to share it with those around us. We want to remain comfortable in our own self-contained, neat, and tidy lives — without the headaches of loving those around us by helping them in their time of need.


"Remember the words of the Lord Jesus, how he himself said, 'It is more blessed to give than to receive.' "Remember that God has placed you in a church, not only to receive His grace and mercy, but to press His eternal and temporal blessings into service to your neighbor.

Your tithes and offerings ensure that those around you have a pastor to preach the life-saving and life-giving Word of God. They ensure that the lights, heat, and air-conditioning are working. 

Giving thanks for all things

It's easy to list the blessings in life: good health, family, a satisfying career, a comfortable home. We might even be thankful for things others take for granted, such as freedom, clean drinking water, reliable transportation and food enough to eat. Then there are the little things, such as gardens, sunrises, pets and coffee.

What about life's storms or unanswered prayers? Should we be thankful for these? Loss and hardship remind us of our dependence on God. He uses trials to draw us closer to him, to show us that he is our rock and refuge. In misfortune and grief, we discover God's comfort and strength. Should we not, then, be thankful for the storms, too?

The beginning of Advent

November is the month of Thanksgiving, but it often also includes the beginning of a new church year. This year, November 29th is the first Sunday of Advent. The season of Advent is about Jesus, the Word, "coming." It's about anticipating and preparing for Christ's arrival.

God comes to us in many and various ways. He speaks to us through the prophets and saints. He comes and speaks to us when we are listening. He comes in the beauty and mysteries of nature. Most of all, God comes in the person of Christ, speaking to his listeners face to face.

Pastor Edmund Steimle put it this way: "The Christian story is a story of God coming into the middle of life, of our lives, opening the dialogue with us."

That's what Advent is really all about: God visiting the earth in person to speak with anyone and everyone who is ready to do so.

God's precious saints

A man mourning the sudden death of his young wife wondered, "Where was God when Jenny died?" Unable to sleep, he turned to Scripture and read Psalm 116:3 (NIV): "The anguish of the grave came upon me: I was overcome by trouble and sorrow." The man's anguish echoed the psalmist's. Reading on, he discovered verse 15: "Precious in the sight of the Lord is the death of his saints."

"What does it mean by precious?" the man wondered. The footnote proved helpful: "Not in the sense of highly valued, but of that which is carefully watched over." The widower pictured God watching over his wife in her last moments. "That's where God was," the man thought with relief.

May we, too, be assured that God cares for his saints — not only at death but also in life, through grief and into healing.





A Report on Camp Okoboji Off-season Projects:

MINISTRY: Our off-season ministry project is seeking ways to expand and grow our ministry capabilities and opportunities at Camp Okoboji. Currently, we have issued a call for a full-time Discipleship Leader. In addition, we are having discussions with a congregation exploring the potential of sharing an additional Discipleship staff member and at the same time working with another congregation to pursue a Discipleship Intern.

PLAYGROUND UPDATE: The landscape company has completed the final ground preparation and solid pack required for the pour of the rubber base. The new playground pieces are being installed now. Unfortunately, the company doing the rubber pour has made the decision that it will not pour any new projects in lowa for this year. The pour requires the temperature to be above 50 degrees throughout the pour and additional cure time. We have requested that we be scheduled for early spring, whenever the temperatures will allow the company to begin working in lowa again.


EZRA CABIN: Progress is being made on Ezra Cabin. The old Ezra Cabin is gone, the groundwork is completed, the foundation and slab have been poured. Former members of Laborers for Christ have arrived and will be the contractors in building the new Ezra Cabin. They anticipate framing and enclosing the building within the next 2 to 3 weeks.

BAUMANN CABIN: Replacing Baumann as a small retreat center will be our next facilities project. Currently, we are reaching out to seek architectural/design assistance in developing plans for the replacement of Baumann. Camp does have a funding reserve for the Baumann Project. However, additional fundraising will be required to fully fund the project.



Stewardship Emphasis



hen was the last time you actually used a dictionary? I am not talking about the last time you accessed one of the web-based sites that serve as a dictionary. When was the last time you actually held one of those books in your hands and used it for its intended purpose? For me, it has been a long time. I don't think I have used a dictionary in its totality since I was being taught how to use it in elementary school.

The vast majority of us view the dictionary as a book that provides definitions for words and phrases. This is very important for communication. Words need to be well defined for a cogent discussion to take place. How often have we been involved in a discussion with someone in person or online who is clearly using a word in a way that is not in line with its proper meaning? It renders the conversation pointless because it is not based on the solid foundation of a shared definition.

But a dictionary has even more than definitions. It also gives instruction on how words are to be pronounced. In fact, when you look up a word in the dictionary, the entry does not start with the definition. It starts with a pronunciation key! It shows how the word should sound and how it should be properly accented. With so much of our conversation being spoken, correct pronunciation of a word is also critical for communication. Mispronounced words can lead to miscommunication of ideas at best and confusion, frustration and even harm at worst. If we AC-cent the wrong SYL-lable, we can run into difficulties.

Defining stewardship rightly

The same thing happens in stewardship. We are deep in the time of the year when congregations and ministries are carrying out their annual "stewardship emphasis." This task is absolutely essential for congregations to carry out. As has been noted in previous editions of StewardCAST, stewardship must be taught. Faithful stewardship flies in the face of a fallen human nature. Created in the image of God, the steward is to reflect the will of the Creator within creation by the way he stewards what the Lord has made for His glory and the benefit of the neighbor. This free and joyous activity of the child of God, and God's family the church, is to be carried out for God's purposes. But so often our stewardship is marred by wanting our will to be done. So when a congregation embarks

on their annual stewardship emphasis, they are really communicating an important definition.

However, steward leaders can run the risk of putting the EM-phasis on the wrong SYL-lable! This happens when the teaching of stewardship is tied to the activity of the steward rather than their identity. This misplaced EM-phasis can lead to despair, manipulation or even

self-righteousness. When a stewardship emphasis is based on human effort, the hearers are shamed and the leaders are tempted to manipulate. We have all heard well-meaning steward leaders talk about sacrifice. "If we would all give up one Starbucks run and put that in the plate, everything would be fine." Or "if we all just gave five dollars more each week we would have more than enough money for ministry." This is manipulation. It also runs the risk of crushing the souls of those who know they have been less than faithful stewards over the years and are seeking in repentant

faith to get it back in line, but don't have the extra fiver at the moment. On the other end, there is the self-righteousness of "Well I have been doing my part! I tithe!" Or there is the age-old stewardship Ponzi scheme approach that says, "I give to God with a spoon and God blesses me with a scoop shovel!" Do you remember seeing those old lapel pins?

A biblical and confessional stewardship emphasis

But these approaches are not at all in line with the Scripture. When steward leaders carry out a biblical and confessional stewardship emphasis, it points the steward not to what they do but to who they are! Stewards steward because that is what they

have been given to do. This is the emphasis that we need to put in place. Steward leaders are in place to simply lead those under their care to be who they are made to be. When they fail in this stewardship, they are pointed to the Great Steward, Jesus Christ, who was for them once and for all what they could never be, at the cross and empty tomb. This treasure delivered at font, altar and pulpit is what the steward is given to steward in the world. This Gospel becomes the


only treasure that the Christian steward has. Everything that stewardship has emphasized

in the past—time,
talents, treasures,
etc.—are really not
stewardship. They are
the means by which we
steward the Gospel to
those around us. The
Gospel of Jesus is the
will of God that we are
to reflect to the world
that is full of death and
darkness.

Any emphasis that doesn't start with Christ and flow back to Christ working in and through the steward is one that is guilty of EM-phasis on the wrong SYL-lable! If we are honest, only hitting on the EM-phasis once a year

isn't sufficient. This is a year-round effort. Pointing people to the use of good First Article gifts for the sake of the Gospel and it reaching the neighbor is an emphasis that is needed every week. Doing this, every week becomes a stewardship Sunday. Every lectionary text is a stewardship text. Every baptismal remembrance is a stewardship event. Every steward kneeling at the rail to receive Christ is a stewardship event.

With the proper Gospel emphasis, stewardship is nothing to be feared. With proper Gospel emphasis, it can't be relegated to once a year, either. When stewardship is properly defined and accented, the message is one that sets stewards up to be all that they have been created and redeemed to be.
